Luke 7:18-23 Then the disciples of John reported to him concerning all these things. And John, calling two of his disciples to him, sent them to [a]Jesus, saying, "Are You the Coming One, or [b]do we look for another?" When the men had come to Him, they said, "John the Baptist has sent us to You, saying, 'Are You the Coming One, or do we look for another?' "And that very hour He cured many of [c]infirmities, afflictions, and evil spirits; and to many blind He gave sight. Jesus answered and said to them, "Go and tell John the things you have seen and heard: that the blind see, the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, the poor have the gospel preached to them. And blessed is he who is not [d]offended because of Me."

There is a "Golden Oldie" song by the Shirelles titled "Mama Said." The song's refrain is "Mama said there'd be days like this, there'd be days like this Mama said." Recently, I experienced a week or two of "Days like this" with multiple Regional Ministry challenges.

The Pandemic has been hard on many small congregations who are coming to the realization it is time to end their churches ministry. In just the first four months of 2024, I've had seven congregations in ABCOPAD contact me regarding the possibility of closing their church. ABCOPAD, a pillar of support, is working with three congregations currently in the process of closing. With over a decade of experience, ABCOPAD is well-equipped to help congregations through the legal, financial and emotional struggles of closure. Rev. Dr. Jeff Johnson, former Acting Co-Executive Regional Pastor and former Regional Pastor for Congregations serves as our Consultant for Churches in Transition seeking to merge with another congregation or close their doors. ABCOPAD has a

dedicated team including myself, Treasurer Caryl Casey, Administrator Denise Veselicky and our Vice President Lori Jennings to resource churches who recognize the need to bring their current ministry to a close. These are emotional conversations with no easy answers as people who have been committed to the church ministry experience the loss and grief of their church closure. In my mind, the song is playing, "Mama said there'd be days like this."

There have also been congregations in our Region that have decided to end their partnership with ABCOPAD. Due to changes in our denomination, these congregations feel they no longer align with the values they see in the denomination. Some have said that while they appreciate ABCOPAD's values and ministries, they can no longer remain a member of the ABC. Other pastors and congregational leaders have asked our ABCOPAD staff and me to attend business meetings to discuss trends in our denomination. More moments when I hear the song playing, "Mama said there'd be days like this."

There have been moments recently when I think to myself, "Jesus, did I hear you correctly? I thought we were going to do Regional Ministry together. I thought there would be mission trips, discipleship and evangelism. I thought we would see the Kingdom of God expand and grow. When you called me to Regional Ministry, did I get this wrong?"

Perhaps John the Baptizer, sitting in jail, was asking himself similar questions. John may have been asking himself, "Did I get this right? Is Jesus really the Messiah? Maybe I was wrong about him." John's questions eventually forced him to send messengers to ask Jesus the questions plaguing his mind.

Jesus does not answer John's Messengers directly. Instead, he continues to do the ministry he has been doing all along. Jesus allows John's Messengers to witness firsthand the power of God at work. The Messengers see broken people healed and lives transformed. He tells John's Messengers to bring back that report to encourage John.

Over the past several weeks, seeing so many exciting Social Media posts surrounding Holy Week and Easter has encouraged me. It has been a joy to see vibrant worship services that often included baptisms as people make public professions of faith in Jesus. I have witnessed people walk the aisle as they express their desire to become followers of Jesus for the very first time. Seeing community outreach programs, including Cross Walks, Holy Thursday, and Good Friday Services, has been a joy. There have been recent ordinations and certifications demonstrating God is still calling pastoral leaders to service and people are saying yes to the call.

I have been encouraging our GPS to watch the social media posts of the churches they serve, find celebratory posts like baptisms, and share them on our regional Facebook page. Jesus wanted John's Messengers to stop looking at the challenges of ministry and to focus on the incredible things God was doing. I believe Jesus wants us to do the same thing. Yes, there will be "Days like this" in our ministries.

But God is still about healing, restoration and calling new disciples. Most churches are still doing exciting ministry, making it easier to see God at work. If you have something exciting happening at your church, please get in touch with me or one of our regional staff members so we can share it with our ABCOPAD family. **Hebrews 10:24-25** Let us think of ways to motivate one another to acts of love and good works. And let us not neglect our meeting together, as some people do, but encourage one another, especially now that the day of his return is drawing near.

#### May Memories and Celebrations...

As I think about the month of May in my life and the life of the church, this month is highlighted by several celebrations and memories. As I reflected on these things, I was reminded of the verses that Paul writes in the opening chapter of 2 Timothy: I am reminded of your sincere faith, which first lived in your grandmother Lois and in your mother Eunice and, I am persuaded, now lives in you also. For this reason I remind you to fan into flame the gift of God, which is in you through the laying on of my hands. For the Spirit God gave us does not make us timid, but gives us power, love and self-discipline. 2 Timothy 1:5-7

On May 12 we will celebrate Mother's Day and then on May 13, my grandmother will celebrate her birthday. As I think about both my mom and grandmother early this month, I know I could fill their names in the verse that Paul writes to Timothy. My faith is a result of my grandmother, Frances, who watched me when I was a little boy. She read me Bible stories, demonstrated the love of Christ, and was even my fourth grade Sunday School teacher. It was in my grandmother's back bedroom where I first accepted Jesus Christ as my Lord and Savior while she kneeled alongside me. Still today, my grandmother encourages my faith, praying for me, and calling me most Sundays after she watches our church service via Facebook.

In the same way, my mother, Terri, was influential in my faith. It was my mom who always made sure we got to church, since many weekends my dad was traveling for his job. She made sure my siblings and I were in church, even if that sometimes meant a harried and hurried ride to the church as we were running a few minutes late. Looking back, I realize what a sacrifice it was for my mom to wrangle four kids, drive us to various groups and activities, and still make her faith and our growing relationship with the Lord a priority. This month, give thanks like the words of Paul remind us to, for those women in your life who have made an impact on your faith!

If that was the only connection to May celebrations and memories for me in these verses of 2 Timothy, it would be enough. But the next verse, Paul's encouragement to "fan into flame the gift of God" takes me back to May 2010 when I, along with others in our region attended the Fanning the Flame Conference in Green Lake Wisconsin. I was brand new in pastoral ministry, having only been serving at my first church a year when I attended. I remember having already been through the gauntlet, and that conference giving me an opportunity to take time apart with God, and renew my faith and be filled afresh with the passion to do ministry. In many ways, that conference sparked my own desire to help other pastors have opportunities to do the same, and later this month and then in June, we will seek to do that again in our Pastors' Retreats.

Finally, this year, on May 19, we will celebrate the day of Pentecost and the coming of the Holy Spirit. The last verse in the passage from 2 Timothy speaks to us about the Holy Spirit, and His ministry in our lives. The Spirit empowers us and makes us bold in our faith. He teaches us how to love one another, and reminds us that as people, our call is to discipline ourselves as we seek to continue in our faith, share our faith and live out the calling that God has placed on our lives.

This May, there are many opportunities for us to reflect on and be challenged in our calling to be people of faith who share the Gospel. I pray You would use each day, especially the special Sundays in May, to give thanks to God for those people who have shaped Your faith, and be renewed in Your faith and calling for the Kingdom of God.

The sun has finally started to come out in Northern PA and the days are getting warmer. My children were outside playing last weekend and came in complaining about how hot it was outside. It might have been 70 degrees and sunny – but it was nothing like the heat and humidity we will experience in the summer in a couple of months.

Now that the cold has broken (hopefully), it is a good time for us to get out into our communities to learn more about our neighbors. It is a good time to learn how we can serve our community and neighbors with the love of Jesus.

Here are four ways - good ways - to connect with your community if it has been difficult to step outside the church doors throughout the winter:

Your local school is desperate for people to come alongside them. The principals and teachers at my children's elementary school are incredible people that wear many different hats throughout a typical week: they teach students, they interact with families, they sometimes work as social workers, sometimes they are parental figures, sometimes they are advisors, sometimes they are mentors and role models. Principals and teachers know your community because they know the students and families of the community. Chances are that the principals and teachers of your community are under-resourced and under-recognized. Connecting with them (and serving them) will give you a good idea of the community and reveal service opportunities. As the president of the PTA at my kid's school for numerous years, I would invite your church to participate in the PTA/PTO of the school. PTAs are always looking for volunteers. It is a nice way to get to know families, students and staff at the school.

I would bet your local youth sports leagues are looking for people to coach teams and/or volunteer in the snack stand during the games. On top of that, the Little League field and the gymnasium are gathering places of families from all over the community. What you if your church sponsored one of the teams in your little league — so that one team in the league ran onto the field or court all season with your church's name on the shirt? What if your church then committed to being super-fans of that team — where everyone would know the names of all of the kids on the team and root them on at the games? What if your congregants, while sitting at the game watching the kids, got to know and build friendships with the families of the players?

Does your community have neighborhood associations? At the last place I lived, I got involved with the local neighborhood association. It was a good place for me to get to know people and make friends. I learned the desires of the people in my neighborhood, and had a good opportunity to advocate for those desires alongside my neighbors. In that neighborhood, abandoned houses and overgrown lawns were issues of concern for the residents. I had the opportunity to work with my neighbors to advocate in front of city council to move toward good solutions of these blighted properties.

What if we were to ask our neighbors about the community? I have known churches that have gone door to door in their neighborhood and asked neighbors a couple of questions. Here are a few of the questions: "What do you like most about living in this area?" "How can our church pray for you?" "What is the best way for our church to serve this community?" If we are to serve our neighbors, it is good to ask them how we can serve them!

In northern PA, the weather is finally coming to the point where our winter hibernation is over. It is time for all of us to get out into our community, sharing the love of Jesus with our neighbors and in our neighborhoods!





Writing this on the National Day of Prayer, I rarely pass this day that emphasizes the importance of prayer, without thinking of this story.

While working as an activities aide in a care home, I met Sunny. Sunny, whose full name is too long to worry about – per Sunny, served God as a nun from the time she was a teenager until the day she was unable to care for others due to a stroke. It took her ability to walk and caused her left side to be permanently weak. That's when Sunny became a resident in the home where I met her. Her decline of health did not deter her from still serving God – she became a friend to everyone – helping where she could as she rolled her way all through the hallways. Sunny always knew the scoop in her community!

She was a joy to have in my world! When I arrived at work in the morning, she gave me the quick rundown on who she had visited, checked on, prayed for...and why. God blessed me and everyone there with the sunshine Sunny spread! (her shortened name was more than a name, it was HER!)

One morning as I walked past her doorway she cried out, 'Jodie girl, is that you?' Some residents became very keen on listening for who was 'stepping' through the hallway, the sounds of feet identifying who was out of their view. A skill I still find fascinating!

I entered her room to find her in bed – rare – with the bedrails both pulled up into their protective positions. She began to weep to me that she wasn't able to get out of bed because her leg was swollen and how could she be of any help to anyone today? Her joy truly was in helping others. # RENEWAL FOR THE 21ST CENTURY

Can churches in the 21st century stop, reverse, or prevent decline – and even become healthy, thriving congregations? Leading scholar and practitioner of congregational renewal, Michael Beck, says they can.

But the old cookie cutter ways of doing church won't cut it in today's world. If churches are going to stop the shocking rates of pastoral burnout and exodus from the pews, they must learn to be the church with new people, in new places, and in new ways.

For congregations to experience what Beck calls, "re-missioning" they must "grow the center, experiment on the edge." The Five Types deals with the internal work that must happen in a congregation to reorganize for a blended ecology, in which inherited and fresh expressions live together in a symbiotic relationship.

While reading these verses, I couldn't help but think of so many of the "except for you" churches here in ABCOPAD. Last year, 182 congregations were a part of the give-and-take partnership that supports regional work through Partners in Ministry. This financial support means that full-time Staff, GPS Staff and RMA's were able to give assistance and participate in pastoral searches, ordination preparation and services, pastoral retreats, the ABW Ministries conference and the AB Men envisioning retreat, mission trip experiences, disaster relief and pastoral & church anniversaries and celebrations.

Last year, 23 congregations, 8 Associations, ABW Ministries, the AB Men, ACTS, 3 camps in ABCOPAD, Women in Ministry, the Commission on Ministerial Leadership and Student Ministries were able to **take** advantage of the grants that are available through 3 funds that ABCOPAD administers and disburses twice a year when the earnings allow.

Paul's writing reminds us that the work of the kingdom happens when people want to be on both sides of this equation. We need to **give** to the work happening in and around ABCOPAD and we need to **take** advantage of the fruits of that labor, to further ministry in our congregations, communities and with partners in other countries.

Partners in Ministry encompasses the very definition of the **give-and-take** that Paul describes. Without the **give** (gifts) no work or support for pastors and congregations can happen, without the **take** (grants) churches, Associations, ABW Ministries, AB Men, the Ministers Council, ACTS, and Student Ministries miss out on opportunities to envision and live out the words of Jesus, "Go out and train everyone you meet, far and near, in this way of life, marking them by baptism in the threefold name: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Then instruct them in the practice of all I have commanded you. I'll be with you as you do this, day after day after day, right up to the end of the age."
